The use of credit continued throughout history, as merchants utilized a variety of methods to keep track of their customers' debts. For example, during the eighteenth century in Great Britain, tallymen would sell clothes to customers in exchange for small, weekly payments. In order to keep track of the shoppers' debts, the tallymen kept long wooden sticks with notches on one side representing the payments made and notches on the other side representing the amount of money still owed. Other types of credit measures, such as metal plates and coins, were also used to keep track of debt in ancient and early modern times.

The first credit cards originated in the United States during the 1920s. Enjoying the booming economy of the era and hoping to attract more customers, individual companies began to issue cards to their customers that would allow them to make purchases at the store or company and pay the money back at a later date. While these cards could be used only at the store that issued them, some companies began to accept each other's credit cards during the late 1930s. This was the first use of third-party payment, where the company that issued the card would pay the merchant that accepted the card. The customer would then pay back the card-issuing company. Third-party payment would later become the primary operating method of bank credit cards.

The current average sodium intake in the United States is about 3,400 milligrams a day, equivalent to about one and a half teaspoons of salt. Dietary guidelines recommend that the average be reduced to 2,300 for the general population and 1,500 for subgroups deemed at greater risk, including adults older than 50 African-Americans, and people with high blood pressure, diabetes, or chronic kidney disease. Those broad guidelines, which do not necessarily apply to individual patients, were based on research that showed that lowering sodium intake reduces high blood pressure, a widely accepted cause for risk of cardiovascular disease and stroke. But, in recent years, a series of studies have focused on actual health outcomes, not blood pressure levels, with perplexing results.

The Institute of Medicine, at the request of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, appointed a committee of experts to review the controversial issue. It found that the outcome of the data, admittedly sparse and limited, does not support lowering sodium intake to 1,500 milligrams a day for the subgroups at risk and that some of these groups might suffer adverse health effects at that level; it found insufficient evidence that dipping below 2,300 would decrease the risk of disease. _____, the American Heart Association stood by the very low level.

The panel did not conclude that the average intake of 3,400 milligrams a day is necessarily a risk. Instead, it called for more vigorous research to clarify the issue that is sure to be confusing for the public.

Physical and genetic evidence suggests that dolphins found in waters off northern Australia are distinct within the humpback family. This group generally grows up to 2.4 meters in length and inhabits coastal waters from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The evidence for the distinct species in northern Australia is outlined in the academic journal, Molecular Ecology. "Based on the findings of our combined morphological and genetic analyses, we can suggest that the humpback family includes at least four member species," said Dr. Martin Mendez. He added: "This discovery helps our understanding of the evolutionary history of this group and informs conservation policies to help safeguard each of the species."

The authors analyzed physical data gathered mostly from beached dolphins and museum specimens. Specifically, the team examined features from 180 skulls covering most of the distribution area of the group in order to _____. The researchers also collected 235 tissue samples from humpback dolphins, from the eastern Atlantic to the western Pacific Oceans, and analyzed both mitochondria and nuclear DNA to study variation. Dr. Nicholas Higgs, a marine biologist, said that "It is an interesting and significant finding and has important conservation implications, namely that the Australian population is a distinct species and should be given conservation status on its own." He added: "We knew that there were humpback dolphins living off northern Australia, but didn't realize that they were a separate species from those living in the rest of South-East Asia."

The growth of the Internet, social networking, and mobile technology transformed how people communicate and exchange information, but congress has lagged in updating federal privacy laws to safeguard digital communications from inappropriate prying. Late last month, the Senate Judiciary Committee made some serious progress in the right direction. By a voice vote, and with only one Senator asking to go on record in opposition, the committee approved a measure that would significantly enhance the privacy protection given to e-mails. The bill, an amendment to the outdated 1986 law that now governs e-mail access, would require law enforcement agents to get a search warrant from a judge in order to obtain e-mail content from a network service provider that holds private electronic messages, photos, and other personal records. If we have a runny nose, a cough, or a stomach upset, we often say we have caught a bug or a virus, by which we mean some kind of germ. The notion of "catching" something is so natural to us that it is hard to realize how amazing it was when someone caught up with a theory that diseases can be caused by germs. Although English is the official language in the Philippines, Spanish is still perceived as an elite language for its historical and cultural importance, much more than English. In fact, Mestizo families and young students continue to use Spanish, especially in the provinces of Cebu, Zamboanga, and Bacolod. This is a consequence of the Spanish roots left in the Filipino language throughout the colonial period, from 1565, when the Spanish language was first introduced, up to the beginning of the twentieth century, when the American hegemony started. In 1990 there were about 2,700 Spanish speakers in the country. Researchers have discovered a natural ingredient that relieves chronic pain, including backaches, in an ancient Chinese plant. The compound, called DHCB, comes from the roots of the flowering Corydalis herb, which the Chinese have used for centuries to treat pain.

The Corydalis plant is grown primarily in China. For thousands of years, people in the country have harvested the plant's roots or tubers, ground them up, and boiled them in vinegar. The concoction, often processed into a tea, was given to treat pain. Although effective in easing all types of pain, including temporary and inflammatory joint pain, (A<u>it</u> may have its greatest benefit in treating long-term nagging pain, for which experts say there is no good medicine.

A researcher with the University of California Davis, Olivier Civelli explains that the so-called opioid drugs like morphine are often given to treat chronic pain when they should only be prescribed for a short period of time because of their addictive properties. But DHCB, says Civelli, appears to be both effective and non-addictive in the treatment of persistent pain. Addictive drugs act through a morphine pathway in the brain. But Civelli says it appears that DHCB works through another brain transport chemical called a dopamine D2 receptor, which studies suggest plays a role in pain sensation.

[48-50] The northern lights could be visible tonight in what the British Geological Survey has described as the best chance to see the elusive natural wonder in years. A strong geomagnetic storm is heading in the direction of the Earth and is expected to hit the Earth's atmosphere on Thursday. This means that by nightfall those able to find clear, dark skies in the U.K. have a chance of witnessing the multi-coloured light show, which occurs when charged particles of the storm collide with our atmosphere.

"It's been a long time since we've had the right 'solar weather' for <u>Athis</u> to occur," says Alan Thomson, head of geomagnetism at the British Geological Survey. "The Sun goes through 11-year cycles of activity and we're at the peak of that, so now really is the best time in years to see the northern lights."

The solar flare that could cause this peak in activity exploded from the Sun's surface at approximately 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, prompting the Space Weather Prediction Center to announce they are expecting strong geomagnetic storm conditions to occur on Earth over the next two days.

Of course, weather conditions play a huge role in the visibility of the aurora. According to the Met Office, the best chances of seeing the aurora are to the north of a line from Tyneside across to the north coast of northern Ireland, but it may be visible further south.
