As the world's largest emitter of carbon, China has decided that one of the best ways to clean up its polluted air is through solar power. (A) The country has led the world in solar installations for the last two years and will likely do so again in 2015. Back in 1967, Scottish inventor John Shepherd-Barron thought getting cash should be as easy as getting a chocolate bar. He is credited with pioneering the first cash machine or ATM in a Barclays Bank in London, UK. But the difficulties lay in ensuring that you were who you said you were.

To prevent problems, Shepherd-Barron developed a special type of paper cheque that acted as a precursor to the debit cards we have today. Each cheque would cause his cash machine to request a personal identification number - or PIN - that only the account holder knew. Not only is aspirin a standard remedy for pain and fever, but it's also used to prevent serious illness. Millions of heart attack and stroke survivors pop a low-dose tablet every day to stop them having another event and, increasingly, healthy people are taking it daily to safeguard their cardiovascular health, too.

We've known for a long time that aspirin is very effective in preventing heart attacks and strokes in people with a cardiovascular problem. The drug works by thinning the blood to help prevent small blood clots. More recently, there's been evidence that low doses of daily aspirin can prevent gastro-intestinal cancers as well as breast and prostate cancer, and can also slow mental decline.

But, because aspirin thins the blood, people taking it regularly may actually be at higher risk of a stroke because their brains bleed more. Its long-term use has also been linked to macular degeneration and increased risk of internal bleeding.

General practitioner Dr Marles says those can benefit from the drug include people who have had any sort of heart event like a heart attack or a stroke. For everyone else, it's up to a doctor to carefully weigh up their risks of cardiovascular disease and bleeding.
