Chinese intellectual activity, from poetry to military tracts, builds upon references to a long intellectual past, especially to what are known as the Five Classics. Consequently, idioms and points of reference can transmit encyclopedic layers of meaning in astonishingly brief lines. Along with the *Kung-yung* and the *Ku-liang* commentaries, the *Tso chuan* sets out to explain the background and significance of the events related in the fifth of the great Five Classics, the *Ch'un-Ch'iu*, or the *Spring and Autumn Annals*. Employing extremely laconic language, it chronicles events in the state of Lu from 722 to 482 B.C. The *Annals* were essential study for China's educated classes across the millennia. An Asian scholar notes that they were regarded "not only as the authority upon questions of ancient history ... but as the embodiment of moral law ... and the source of all wisdom and right knowledge." Not too many Koreans would answer “Yes” if they were asked whether they think Confucianism is a religion. Koreans do not regard it as religion. However, if you were to shift the question a bit and ask whether they would practice filial piety, the most integral part of Confucianism, almost all Koreans would not hesitate to answer “Yes.” For Koreans, Confucianism is their life itself, rather than a particular teaching that is separate from their daily activities. This is true even in the younger generations of today. They strongly dislike Confucianism, and believe it is quite pre-modern. In their heads, Confucianism is an ideology of the past dynasty that ① \_\_\_\_\_ no relevance to modern generations. Most people prefer swallowing a pill to being poked with a needle. [A] Intravenous injections get medicine to the bloodstream faster, and some protein-based drugs — insulin, for instance — can't be taken orally. The stomach starts digesting them before they can be absorbed. Now researchers have come up with a better way for you to take your medicine: Swallow the needle. [B] From the outside, this new pin “looks like any other multivitamin,” says chemical engineer Carl M. Schoellharruner, “but once it reaches the stomach, the outer coating dissolves, and it reveals the needle.” [C] The stainless steel needles, one-twentieth of an inch long, release the drug when they [A] penetrate the lining of the gastrointestinal(GI) tract. Don't worry, you won't feel a thing. [D] The GI tract doesn't register pain. And at a bit more than three-quarters of an inch long, this capsule is small enough to travel through the tract. Capital is money that is invested in order to make more money. By ①\_\_\_\_\_ the term capital is often used to refer to money that is available for investment or, indeed, any asset that can be readily turned into money for it. Thus, a person's house is often described as their capital, because they can turn it into capital either by selling it or by borrowing on the strength of it. Many small businesses are indeed set up in this way. It is, however, only possible to turn property into capital if its ownership is clearly established, its value can be measured, its title can be transferred, and a market exists for it. A characteristic feature of the development of capitalist societies is the emergence of institutions that enable the conversion of assets of all kinds into capital. Hernando Sotelo has argued persuasively that it is the absence of these institutions, not to mention functioning systems of property law, that frustrates the emergence of local capitalisms in the Third World. He claims that an enormous amount of value that is located up in property cannot therefore be realized and put by entrepreneurs to productive use.

Attitudes to climate change seems to have been sharply polarized along political lines at least in America. A large-scale survey in 2013 shows that 70% of Democratic voters saw evidence of man-made climate change in recent weather patterns, whereas only 19% of Republican voters did. It is not that conservatives are ignorant. Knowledge of science makes little difference to people's beliefs about climate change, except that it makes them more certain about what they believe. Republicans with a good knowledge of science are more skeptical about global warming than less knowledgeable Republicans.

The best explanation for the gap is that people's beliefs about climate change have become determined by feelings of identification with political groups. When people are asked for their views on climate change, they seem to translate this into a broader Question: whose side are you on? The issue has become associated with Democrats, causing conservatives to dig in against it. The divide may not be resolved within a few years.

Everything a family needs to plan and host a memorable party, except the cake and ice cream, is delivered to the home in a large basket.
