Paul Nation, a language educator, argues that most English as a Foreign Language classes are not productive because they do not include a wide variety of learning activity. He claims that language courses need a(n) (A)_____ among four main strands, or types of activity: meaning-focused meaning-focused input, output, language-focused learning activities, and fluency development activities. The first refers to students listening to or reading a large amount of interesting and relatively easy language. The students should already know 98 percent of the words they read or hear. The second strand involves students talking or writing. In these activities, students choose whichever form they want; they are under no pressure from the teacher to use a specific form. For example, if they talk about a movie they saw, they could say either 'I liked the ending,' or 'I like the ending,' or 'The ending was great.' What is important is their listener understands their message. The third strand, Nation argues, is over-represented in language teaching. All grammar exercises, repeating dialogues, and listening for details are examples. He says this strand needs to be greatly reduced to make equal time for the others. The final strand, fluency development, requires increasing the speed at which students read, write, listen, and speak. It is almost completely ignored in traditional EFL programs.

Whether you're the owner of the Dallas Cowboys or captain of the playground dodge-ball team, the goal in picking players is the same: (A)_____. Everyone wants a team of stars. While there is no denying that exceptional players can put points on the board and enhance team success, new research by Roderick Swaab suggests there is a limit to the benefit top athletes bring to a team. Swaab compared the amount of individual talent on teams with the teams' success, and he found striking examples of more talent hurting the team. If someone speaks in a monotone in English, other English-speakers can easily understand. But in many languages, pitch is as important as vowels and consonants for distinguishing one word from another. In English, "pay" and "bay" are different (A)_____. That's what it feels like to speak what linguists call a tone language. Perhaps the basic difference between fiction and film is that fiction requires its audience to (A)_____, whereas film presents images and sounds directly. Frequent flying and regularly crossing time zones disrupts your circadian rhythm, or internal clock, and causes jet lag. In Toyama Bay, Japan, visitors idling on a pier overlooking the water were greeted by a 12-foot-long red-and-white giant squid. Despite its massive size, this squid was a juvenile. Dead specimens have been measured as long as 43 feet. The giant squid spends its life in the abyssal depths of the open ocean. These gigantic, solitary predators feast upon other deep sea fish or squid and are themselves hunted by sperm whales in what must unfold into epic battles of giants in the blackness of the deep ocean. They have been found dead washed up ashore or tangled in fishermen's nets for centuries, but have only been captured on film alive twice before. In 2004, researchers snapped the first images of a live giant squid, and in 2012, an expedition filmed a live giant squid for the first time ever; it was wrangling with their iridescent lures thousands of feet below the surface of the ocean. But the video of the Toyama Bay visitor is the most detailed and up-close viewing of a live giant squid yet. The animal was filmed with a submersible camera by Akinobu Kimura.
