Albert Schweitzer was born in 1875 in Alsace. At that time, it was a part of Germany. His generous spirit was first awakened through his training as a Lutheran minister. Besides gaining a reputation as a preacher, he also became respected for his ability to play the organ. He was a man of many talents. His concern for other people turned his attention to medicine. He had also acquired doctoral degrees in philosophy and music. His wife took an interest in medicine also and became a nurse. Many people thought that he should remain and lecture in Europe to have a strong impact on Western civilization. Though he listened to their suggestions, he ultimately decided to follow his own (A) . This led him to Africa. Albert had felt that all men should accept the responsibility of helping others. He felt particularly concerned for black Africans who had been exploited by white men. He earned the money he needed by performing on the organ and by lecturing. With this money he bought equipment and opened a hospital in Africa. He was a man of great strength who faced great problems with courage. The threat of war, the reality of imprisonment during World War One as a German citizen, and the unbearable heat in Africa did not deter him at all. The green anole lizard is usually (1)sold in pet shops as a chameleon, by which name it has been known to generations of American children. The true chameleon and the green anole are actually different animals, but they do have much in common. They are both lizards. Most live in trees or bushes, (2)subsisting mainly on insects. Both can change color, although the anole's ability to do so is considerably more limited than the chameleon's. This is the trait that has made chameleons and anoles popular as pets. However, the anole's color change, in contrast to the chameleon's, is not, as many people think, related to the color of the background. Instead, it is (3)determined by such factors as light and temperature or by such emotions as fright, triumph, or defeat. The chameleon is an animal of the Old World, whereas the anoles are found in the warmer regions of North and South America. The chameleon (4)lies from two to forty eggs at a time, the anole only a single egg. Recently biologists have become familiar with the anole as an excellent animal for laboratory studies of the interaction between behavior and hormones. The particular value of the green anoles as experimental animals is that they are abundant and that under the appropriate conditions they will establish in the laboratory the same social system and behavior they display in their natural environment.

The development of Jamestown in Virginia during the second half of the seventeenth century was closely related to the making and use of bricks. There are several practical reasons why bricks became important to the colony. Although the forests could initially supply sufficient timber, the process of lumbering was extremely difficult, particularly because of the lack of roads. Later when the timber on the peninsula had been (A) , wood had to be brought from some distance. Building stone was also (1)in short supply. However, as clay was plentiful, it was inevitable that the colonists would turn (2)from brickmaking. In addition to practical reasons for using bricks as the principal construction material, there was also an ideological reason. Brick represented durability and permanence. The Virginia Company of London instructed the colonists to build hospitals and new residences out of brick. In 1662, the Town Act of the Virginia Assembly provided (3)for the construction of thirty-two brick buildings and prohibited the use of wood as a construction material. Had this law ever been successfully enforced, Jamestown would have been a model city. Instead, the residences failed to comply fully (4)with the law; and by 1699 Jamestown had (B) into a pile of rubble with only three or four habitable houses.

When their children begin talking about dieting, most parents smile indulgently and do not worry. In figure-conscious America, it is quite natural for young people to desire a slim figure. However, for some teenagers, dieting is no laughing matter. For them, dieting is not a momentary whim to be pursued and forgotten; (A) , it is the symptom of a serious emotional disorder called anorexia nervosa, a disease that can have terrible, even fatal consequences.

The disease usually strikes adolescent and preadolescent girls who have no reason to diet. They are not preparing to take part in specialized sports activities requiring a slender figure. These girls stop eating because, despite all evidence to the contrary, they believe they are fat. Determined to lose the imaginary excess poundage, they refuse to eat more than a few morsels of food. Usually, the weight loss is rapid, sometimes more than fifty pounds in a few months.

Some teenagers who are obsessed with the need to diet seek treatment because they or, more typically, their parents realize that the diet is leading to starvation. Others do not seek treatment but simply begin eating normally again on their own. However, because the disease comes in waves, or bouts, a few victims manage to keep it a secret and so avoid both exposure and treatment.

Unfortunately, members of this group are in the most serious danger. Although they may be able to keep their secret into adulthood, the disease, if untreated, almost always goes out of control, with tragic results. (B), some victims-like gymnast Christy Henrich and pop singer Karen Carpenter-die from the physical effects of prolonged starvation. Mortality rates are high: One in ten anorexia patients will die within ten years of the disease's onset. To date, the actual cause of the starvation disease has not been determined.
