Penicillin is effective against many serious bacterial infections. Alexander Fleming, a Scottish scientist, discovered penicillin in 1928. However, he did not immediately understand what he had discovered. At the time he was observing several fungi that could destroy bacteria. However, Fleming was not a very neat scientist. He often left trays of bacteria around his lab. In August 1928, he went away for a vacation. When he returned, he found that something strange had happened to one of the trays. A fungus had grown on the bacteria and killed them. At first, Fleming did not understand why this had happened, but he later realized what he had discovered. He realized that the fungus was powerful and could be useful in curing bacterial infections, but he still had not understood how important it was. He doubted whether the fungus could be effective long enough to kill bacteria inside a human body. The penicillin he grew in the first few years was too slow in taking effect, so he stopped working on it. After a few years, he returned to it. Fleming and other scientists discovered ways to make the ㉠_____ work more rapidly, and it soon became the most effective antibiotic in existence. This discovery has saved millions of lives.

Today we think of the brain as the organ controlling the nervous system, one of the ten or so interacting functional systems the body is divided into by biologists—along with the skeletal system, circulatory system, digestive system, and so on. The nervous system is preeminent because of its two functions.
