Throughout America's history, social welfare has undergone dramatic changes. Originally, the colonists used a system, comparable to that of England, involving "poor laws," which used local taxation to fund what were known as "poorhouses." The Rhine River was the most important waterway for European trade in the Middle Ages. Merchant ships paid tolls as they passed each state along the Rhine, in return for the Holy Roman Empire's protection. But (A)in line with the decline of the empire in the 13th century, barons peppered the riverside with hundreds of castles to claim tolls from passing ships.
